On June 6th, Governor General Mary Simon and her husband, Whit Fraser, visited Natoaganeg First Nation to learn about the Miramichi River. The Governor General spoke with leaders from Natoaganeg First Nation, the North Shore Mi'kmaq Tribal Council (NSMTC)'s Anqotum Resource Management department, and the Atlantic Salmon Federation about the river's conservation challenges.




After the meeting, the Governor General and her team visited the wharf where Natoagenag fishers land and process striped bass caught in the community's commercial fishery. During her visit, Governor General Simon empathized with the situation facing wild Atlantic salmon in the Miramichi, relating her experi-

ence growing up and working in a family-owned salmon camp on the George River in northern Quebec.

PLAMU FIRST 2024 CONFERENCE

The North Shore Mi'kmaq Tribal Council hosted Plamu First 2024 from April 22-24th at the Rodd Miramichi. This gathering brought together participants from First Nations, government, and stakeholder organizations to discuss a path forward for Miramichi salmon conservation. Conference partners and participants were able to share and learn through presentations and round table discussions.

Wela'lieg to everyone who participated, and to our dedicated Plamu First planning partners: the University of New Brunswick, the Canadian Rivers Institute, the Miramichi Salmon Association, the Atlantic Salmon Federation, the Miramichi Watershed Management Committee, and the New Brunswick Salmon Council. The NSMTC hopes to release a follow-up document to Plamu First 2024 later this summer.

SALMON SMOLT RESEARCH

NSMTC Anqotum Resource Management assists annually with Atlantic salmon research being conducted by partner organizations on the northwest branch of the Miramichi River. This work includes helping to collect, count, tag, and release juvenile salmon. The data obtained from this work gives us valuable insight into Atlantic salmon population trends.

Our team also participated in a pilot project this year to explore the viability of a smolt transport program. The project involved collecting smolts on the northwest branch of the river, loading them into oxygen-

ated tanks, and driving them to an area nearer to the estuary, past striped bass spawning grounds where smolt predation occurs.

EDUCATIONAL OUTREACH

On June 5th, Field Technician Joe Augustine visited North & South Esk Regional's Science 8 and Personal Wellness 9 classes to discuss aquatic monitoring, conservation, and climate change. He also shared his education and career path to encourage students to enter the field of biology. We appreciate every opportunity to engage the next generation of conservationists!

L'NUI MENIKUK COASTAL CONSERVATION


Our department has been working closely with community members from L'nui Menikuk (Indian Island First Nation) as they continue work on developing a coastal conservation plan. Through-
